## Winter Agility Classes

BCRMN will be offering Winter Agility Classes for the 3rd year in a row! Agility classes are a great way to get out and train, exercise, and bond w/your dog. Winter classes are indoors, in a heated building w/ matted floors. This offers you a safe (and warm!) place to work w/your dog!

All classes will be held at Water's Edge Dog Center in Buffalo, MN. For more info (and directions), see their site at: <http://www.waters edgedogcenter.com> Classes will run on Sunday afternoons, for a 6 week duration. They will start Sunday February

13 and run through Sunday March 27 (no classes on March 13). Classes are \$50 for BCRMN-adopted dogs and \$60 for non-BCRMN adopted dogs. All dogs should be a minimum of 1 year old, to participate. Below is more "specific" info pertaining to each class:

### Beginning Agility

- **Time:** 3:30-4:30pm

- **Class size:** Minimum 5 dogs, maximum 12 dogs

- **Info:** This class is for dogs and handlers new to agility, or dogs needing a refresher course.

### Intermediate Agility

- **Time:** 4:30-5:30pm

- **Class size:** Minimum 5 dogs, maximum 12 dogs

- **Info:** This class is for dogs who have been through beginning agility and have a basic understanding of the equipment. The dogs must be able to navigate the majority of the equipment w/ out assistance (teeter, contacts, and weaves excluded). This class will focus on basic sequencing and beginning handling.

Formerly known as Annie, I adopted Taser in September 2009 when she was 6 months old.

I was actively looking for a Border Collie puppy on Petfinder.com; however none really caught my eye.

I happened across Border Collie Rescue of Minnesota's Website and found Annie. I didn't inquire into adoption at the time as I figured she'd be snatched up in a second. A month passed and I checked their website

once again. She was still listed as available. The rescue was

holding an adoption event that coming Saturday and we made the drive down to go visit her. It was love at

first site when I noticed her in the crate inside the rescue's van.



Taser (Annie) was very shy when we first met. I don't remember when I first learned of her history, but I

knew that it would take some work to make her comfortable in life. She was one of 120 Border Collies that were seized from an Okla-

homa residence. The owner had dementia and things spiraled out of control.

I brought Taser home on a Tuesday and she ran into my house like

she owned the place. It was like we had Taser her whole life. I enrolled her in puppy classes immediately. She

was very shy and was afraid of walking on the floor of the training school. After carrying her into the building for the first two weeks, she learned how much fun class is! Pretty soon she was pulling me into the building because she wanted to get there as fast as she could.



We have attended puppy, beginner, and intermediate

obedience classes as well as many agility classes. She is quite the social butterfly and loves every dog and person she meets. She fits in well with my pack of dogs and we are very happy we had the chance to adopt her.

## Agility Dogs

Dog agility has so many benefits. The human-canine bond is strengthened, the exercise is healthy for you both, the dog's confidence is built up, you get to hang around with other dog lovin' people, but most of all, it's FUN. The teamwork involved in agility can easily transfer to other dog activities or help with simple obedience at home.

Any breed or mixed breed can do agility. Some dogs will pick up the sport quickly while others proceed at different rates. Puppies can go to foundation

type classes geared for their growing bodies and attention spans. Dogs at least 18 months old and even seniors can compete in agility. Special classifications exist for older dogs or those breeds where jumping at the required heights can be harmful. You may also choose to jump your dog at a lower height if you have concerns about their joints or body structure.

Agility courses can have jumps (single, double, triple, broad, tire), an A-Frame to climb up and over, a dog walk, a teeter,

a chute, weaves, and tunnels which dogs especially love to charge through. Running a course never gets old since there are so many different configurations and also games such as snooker, wildcard, colors, gamblers, etc. There are different venues to suit everybody: USDAA, CPE, AKC and NADAC.

Dogs don't care about ribbons or titles but they can earn both. The biggest reward from agility, however, is the time you and your dog spend together. Article By: Josie Moen

BCRMN is pleased to add a new program designed to help dogs find forever homes and to help new homes find forever dogs; we are proud to introduce our Foster-to-Adopt (FTA) Program!

#### How does it work?

- Simple! Potential adopters can "foster" a dog for 2 weeks prior to making a decision to adopt the dog. If, at the end of that 2 week trial period, the home decides to adopt the dog, they have the first option to do so. If they do decide to adopt the dog, they will continue to foster the dog until the dog's forever home is found!

#### What if someone wants to adopt my FTA dog before my 2 week trial period is up?

- No worries! Your foster dog will not become avail-

able for adoption until the end of your 2 week trial period! The dog will not be on the BCRMN website or Petfinder in that initial 2 week time frame.

#### If I see a dog on the website that I like, can I apply through the FTA program?

- No, FTA is available only for newly arriving dogs in the BCRMN system. Once dogs are on the site, they are not available for foster-to-adopt.

#### The details:

FTA is a great program that several other rescues have started using w/in the past couple of years and have reported great success. BCRMN ran 3 trial FTA runs this fall and had wonderful results. If you know your family wants to adopt a dog, this is a great way to help ensure you find the

perfect forever dog! Interested parties will need to fill out an adoption application and sign a foster home liability waiver. Essentially the family is applying to adopt, but also applying to be a foster home. Once the applications are approved, we'll work closely w/the family to find a dog that best suits their lifestyle (approved homes will be very involved in finding their FTA dog and making sure it's a good fit before bringing into foster care). Once a suitable dog is found, BCRMN will bring the dog into the system and the FTA Approved Home will begin their 2 week trial period!
